This will be accomplished by increasing reading and math instructional time and proficiency, as measured by MAP and KPREP data. Additionally, the amount of behavior incidents that interrupt instruction will decrease. We will positively impact student achievement by increasing the amount of academic time on task and decreasing the amount of time spent out of class addressing behavior incidents. Ineffective discipline strategies have a negative impact on student academic performance by resulting in the loss of academic time of all students, but especially Black male students. The District Racial Equity Policy states "our JCPS Board recognizes that Students of Color (i.e., students who have a racial identity other than White) have been disadvantaged by long-standing inequities in our society, the causes of which are multi-faceted, and reflect historical, social, and institutional factors." A recent Courier Journal Article: JCPS Must Reduce Outrageous Suspensions, state more than 1 in every 11 Black elementary students were suspended during the 2017 school year, compared to 1 in 51 White students. Research shows Black students, especially Black boys, are disciplined more often and are victims to loss of instructional time, more often than White students.
